- What is Evangelism?
 - Evangelism is derived from the Greek word for “good news”.
- Why is the Gospel Considered Good News?

- Good News
 1. Salvation from Sin.
 - Romans 3:23 – All have sinned.
 - Romans 6:23 – The wages of sin is death.
 - 1 Timothy 1:15 – Christ came to save sinners.
 2. Reconciles us to the Lord God Almighty.
 - Isaiah 59:2 – Separated us from God.
 - 2 Corinthians 5:19 – Reconciled us to God.
 3. Gives Us Eternal Life.
 - John 3:16 – Salvation through faith in Jesus.
 - John 11:25 – Life after death.
 - Revelation 21:4 – All suffering passed away.

- Good News (Continued)

- 4. It is a Free Gift.

- Christianity is the only faith where God does all the work on our behalf.
 - The futility of works.
 - The ocean metaphor
 - When good works are evil.
 - Christ alone gets the credit.
 - Ephesians 2:8-9 – No one can boast

- 5. Illustrates God's Love.

- Romans 5:8 – While sinners, Christ died for us.
 - 1 John 3:1 – Called children of God.

- Good News (Continued)

6. The Gospel Transforms Lives.

- The incredible hope of healing, deliverance, renewal, peace, and joy through the gospel.
- 2 Corinthians 5:17 – New creation. The old has gone.

7. The Gospel Brings Purpose to Our Lives.

- Matthew 6:33 – Seek first His Kingdom and receive spiritual blessings.
- Mark 12:30-31 – Love God and your neighbor.
- Acts 1:8 – Witnesses of the gospel.
- Ephesians 2:10 – Called to do good works.
- Philippians 1:6 – God will finish the good works He has called us to do.
- Titus 2:14 – Redeem us and purify us, His own people.

8. The Gospel Is For Everyone.

- Romans 10:13 – Everyone who calls on Jesus will be saved.

- Good News (Continued)
- Evangelism is the act of sharing the good news of Jesus Christ with others.
- We are an unnegotiable essential to God's plan of salvation for our family, friends, neighbors, and co-workers.
 - Matthew 28:19-20 – God will be with us as we make disciples both close to home and far away.
 - Romans 1:16 – I am not ashamed of the gospel.
 - Romans 10:14-17- How can people believe if no one has told them about Jesus?

- Evidence Our World Needs to Hear the Good News

1. A culture in moral and spiritual crisis.

- Confusion derived from the loss of truth
 - What is truth?
 - Who am I?
 - How am I supposed to act?
- Breakdown of institutions
 - Decline of church
 - Decline of family
 - Decline of law and order
 - Decline of education
 - Societal division

- Evidence Our World Needs to Hear the Good News (Continued)
 - Increased mental illness
 - A 2024 poll by the American Psychiatric Association revealed that 43% of U.S. adults felt more anxious than the previous year.
 - A survey indicated that 62% of Gen Z and millennials feel in a constant state of worry, compared to 38% of older generations.
 - Approximately 20% of U.S. teens report symptoms of anxiety or depression.
 - Between 2014 and 2024, the suicide rate for individuals aged 10-24 increased by 56%, with Black youth experiencing a 78% rise.
 - Men are commonly affected by depression, anxiety disorders, substance use disorders, ADHD, and conduct disorders.
 - Approximately 19.1 million women aged 19 to 54 experience anxiety disorders, highlighting a significant gender disparity in mental health challenges

- Evidence Our World Needs to Hear the Good News (Continued)

2. The World's Answers to These Problems Are Futile.

- Self-help
 - One-size-fits-all advice doesn't address the uniqueness of the individual.
 - People gather techniques but don't take the actions to change their lives.
 - Only God can change a person's heart. Ezekiel 36:26, John 15:5
 - Old habits and addictions are hard to break.
 - Worldly achievements do not offer lasting peace, joy, and contentment. Matthew 6:33
 - No community. Ephesians 4:9-10
- Success, wealth, power, fame, influence, and pleasure are meaningless.
 - Ecclesiastes 2:10-11 – Everything is meaningless.
 - Ecclesiastes 5:10 – Never ever satisfied.
 - Matthew 6:19-20 – Treasures on earth vs. treasures in heaven
 - Mark 8:36 – Gain the world but lose the soul.

- Evidence Our World Needs to Hear the Good News (Continued)
 - Philosophies
 - Existentialism and humanism (we are in control of our lives) deny the power of God in our lives that we can't live without.
 - Hedonism exacerbates the true reason people feel miserable – their sin separates them from God.
 - Materialism never satisfies.
 - Nihilism, which holds that life is without inherent meaning, leads many to a sense of hopelessness.
 - Positive thinking or cognitive behavioral techniques don't address the deeper issues of sin, guilt, and the need for redemption

- Evidence Our World Needs to Hear the Good News (Continued)
 - False Religions
 - No atonement for sin.
 - Islam – Jesus didn’t bear the burden of human sin on the cross.
 - No guarantee of “making it”
 - Buddhism – Nirvana might be achieved if you practice the Eightfold Path but it is not guaranteed.
 - Judaism – it seems impossible to perfectly follow God’s law
 - Islam – Allah might think our life was good enough, but we can’t be sure.
 - Hinduism – Perpetual karma and reincarnation does not guarantee eventual Moksha.

- Evidence Our World Needs to Hear the Good News (Continued)
 - Politics
 - A political movement is always temporary. Someone else will come into office in the future and reverse the thing you enjoy today.
 - "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever." (Hebrews 13:8)
 - "My peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid." (John 14:27)
 - A political movement is often divisive. Conflict, polarization, tension.
 - "For he himself is our peace, who has made the two groups one and has destroyed the barrier, the dividing wall of hostility." (Ephesians 2:14)
 - "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God." (Matthew 5:9)

- Evidence Our World Needs to Hear the Good News (Continued)
 - Politics
 - Politicians cannot change the human heart.
 - "The heart is deceitful above all things and beyond cure. Who can understand it?" (Jeremiah 17:9)
 - "Create in me a pure heart, O God, and renew a steadfast spirit within me." (Psalm 51:10)
 - "You will keep in perfect peace those whose minds are steadfast, because they trust in you." (Isaiah 26:3)
 - "Since we have been justified through faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ." (Romans 5:1)

- Evidence Our World Needs to Hear the Good News (Continued)
 - Politics
 - Politicians offer nothing regarding life after death.
 - "For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you a hope and a future." (Jeremiah 29:11)
 - "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who according to His great mercy has caused us to be born again to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead." (1 Peter 1:3)
 - "Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind." (Romans 12:2)
 - "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here!" (2 Corinthians 5:17)

Summary

1. **We have the only answer to sin and brokenness.** No amount of human effort, government policy, or self-improvement can solve the problem of sin. Crime, violence, injustice, and hatred all stem from a deeper issue—the sinful nature of mankind. The gospel is the only solution because:
 - Jesus alone has **paid the penalty** for sin through His death on the cross (Romans 5:8).
 - He offers **forgiveness and transformation** through the power of the Holy Spirit (2 Corinthians 5:17).
 - Only in Christ can people experience **true freedom** from sin's power (John 8:36).
 - John 10:10
 - Galatians 2:20

Summary (Continued)

2. **The gospel is the only hope for societal and cultural healing.** Our culture is increasingly divided—politically, racially, and socially. The gospel transcends these divisions and unites people from all backgrounds under one identity: **children of God**. It teaches:
- Love for God and neighbor (Matthew 22:37-39).
 - Reconciliation between different races and cultures (Ephesians 2:14-16).
 - Humility, kindness, and selflessness over pride and selfish ambition (Philippians 2:3-4).

Summary (Continued)

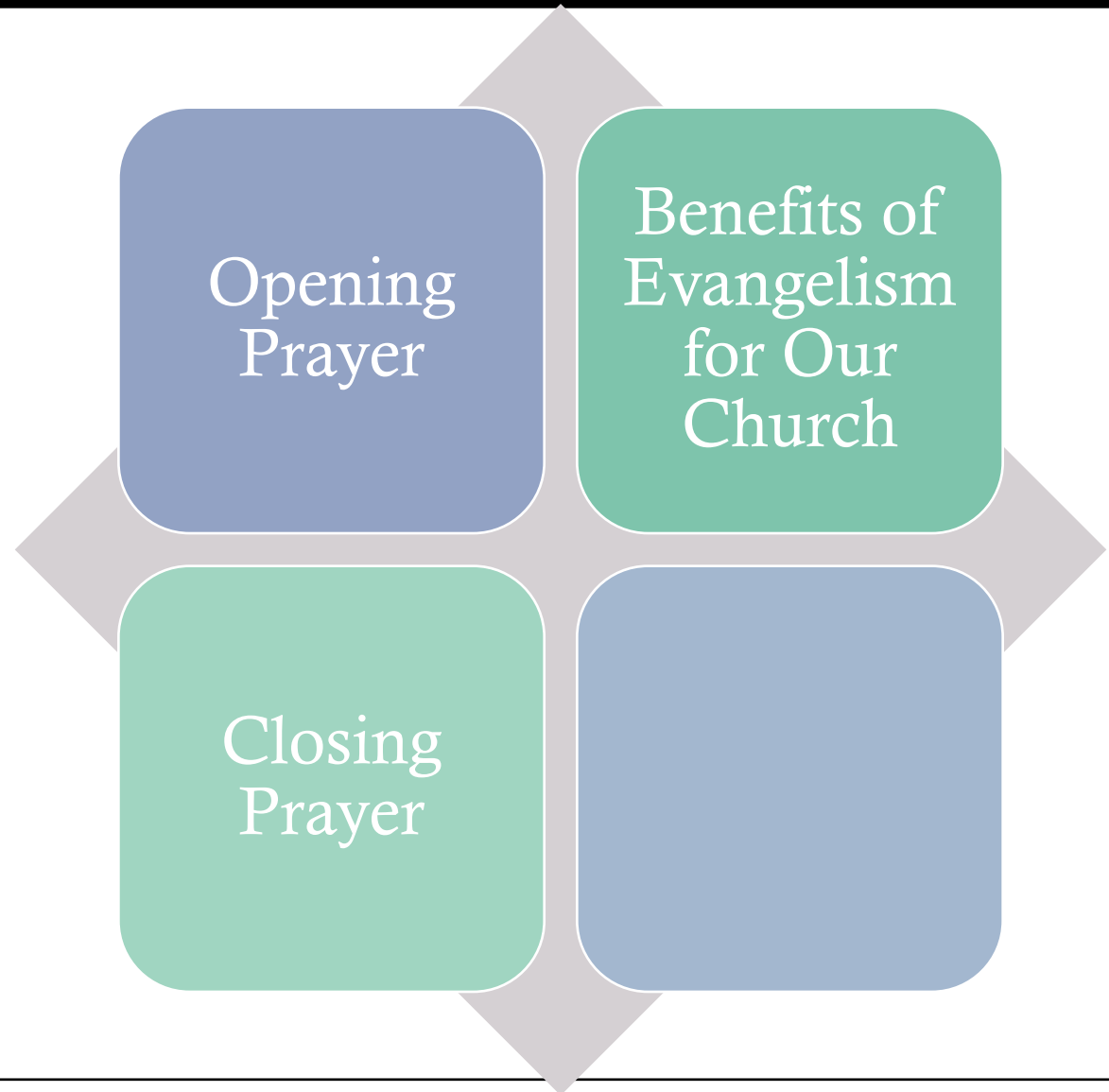
3. **The urgency of eternal destiny.** Many people live as though this life is all there is, yet the Bible makes it clear that **eternity is at stake**. The gospel is urgent because:
- Every person will one day stand before God (Hebrews 9:27).
 - There is only one way to be saved—through Jesus Christ (John 14:6).
 - Hell is real, but God offers salvation to all who believe (Romans 10:9).
 - If we love people, we must share the gospel so they have the opportunity to choose eternal life.

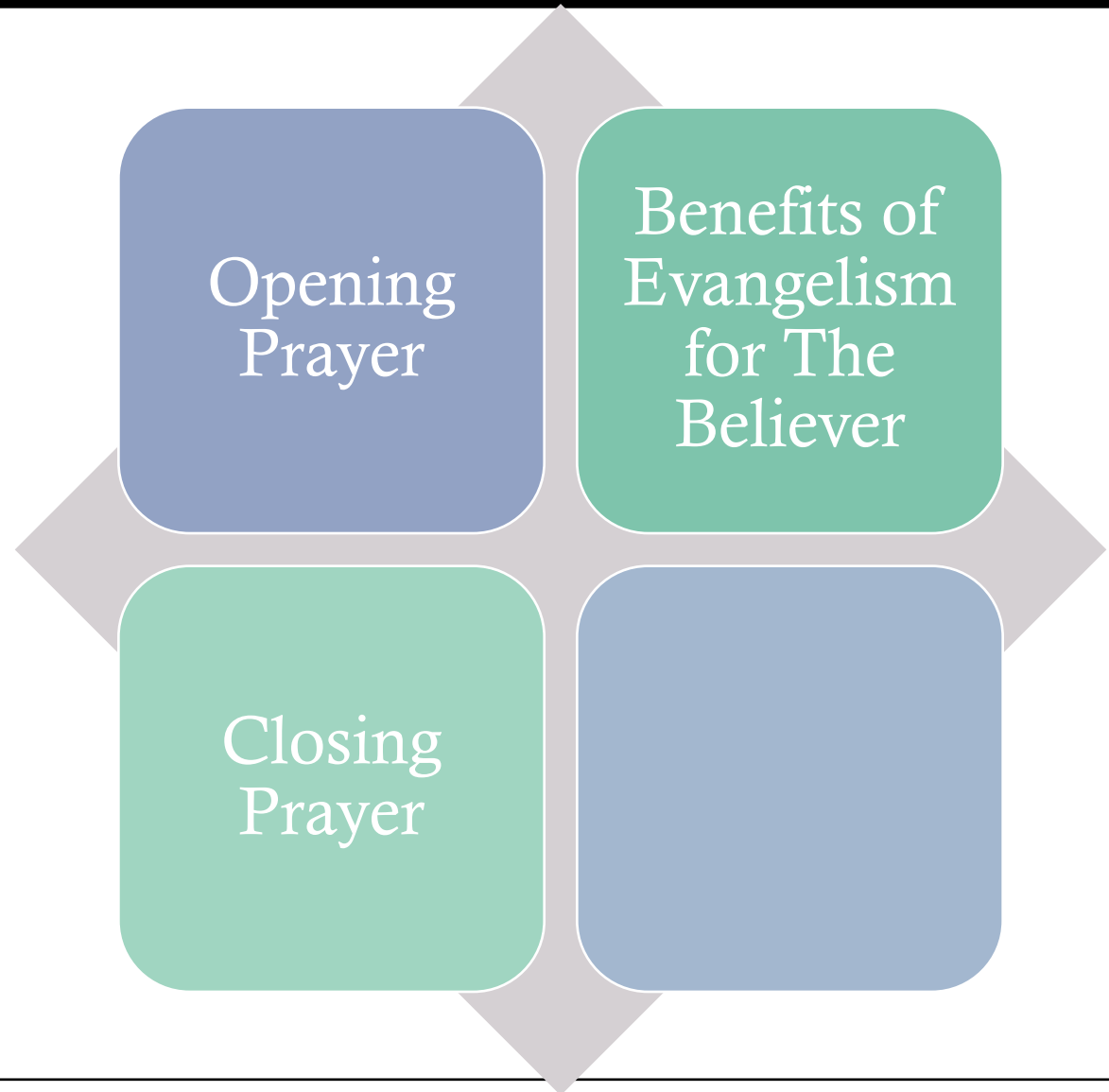

- There are many ways a believer in Jesus Christ can be evangelistic. Evangelism is not limited to preaching or street witnessing—it can take many forms depending on a person's gifts, opportunities, and calling.

10 Ways You Can Be An Evangelist

1. Personal One-on-One Evangelism. This is the most direct form of evangelism, where you share the gospel through personal conversations with friends, family, co-workers, or strangers. It includes:

- **Casual conversations** – Bringing up faith naturally in everyday discussions.
- **Intentional witnessing** – Going out with the specific purpose of sharing the gospel.
- **Lifestyle evangelism** – Living in a way that attracts people to Jesus and creates opportunities to share.

Scripture: *"Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have."* (1 Peter 3:15)

10 Ways You Can Be An Evangelist (Continued)

2. Relational Evangelism (Friendship Evangelism). Building deep relationships with non-believers and letting your faith naturally flow into those relationships.

- **Being a consistent, godly friend.**
- **Inviting them to church or Bible studies.**
- **Answering their questions about faith over time.**

Example:

- Regularly meeting with a non-believing friend, showing Christ's love, and eventually inviting them to church.
- Hosting a dinner where faith is discussed naturally.
- **Scripture:** *"Let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven."* (Matthew 5:16)

10 Ways You Can Be An Evangelist (Continued)

3. **Testimonial Evangelism.** Sharing your personal testimony of how Jesus changed your life. This is a powerful way to evangelize because people relate to personal experiences.
- **Keep it simple** – What was your life before Christ? How did you meet Him? How has He changed you?
 - **Be honest and real** – Authenticity is key.
 - **Use it as a bridge** to share the gospel message.

Scripture: *"They triumphed over him by the blood of the Lamb and by the word of their testimony."*
(Revelation 12:11)



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10 Ways You Can Be An Evangelist (Continued)

4. Digital and Social Media Evangelism. In today's world, social media and digital platforms provide huge opportunities for evangelism.

- **Posting Bible verses, Christian quotes, or personal testimonies.**
- **Creating YouTube videos, podcasts, or blogs about faith.**
- **Sharing the gospel through private messages or group discussions.**

Scripture: *"Proclaim his salvation day after day. Declare his glory among the nations, his marvelous deeds among all peoples."* (Psalm 96:2-3)

10 Ways You Can Be An Evangelist (Continued)

5. Church-Initiated Evangelism (Invitational Evangelism). Not everyone feels comfortable sharing the gospel verbally, but inviting people to church is a powerful form of evangelism.

- **Invite people to Sunday services, Bible studies, or special church events.**
- **Encourage them to join a small group.**
- **Follow up with them and answer their questions.**

Example:

- Bringing a neighbor to a Christmas service where the gospel is preached.
- Inviting a co-worker to a men's or women's Bible study.

Scripture: *"Come and see what God has done, his awesome deeds for mankind!"* (Psalm 66:5)

10 Ways You Can Be An Evangelist (Continued)

6. Street Evangelism & Public Preaching. For those who are bold and gifted in public speaking, street evangelism and open-air preaching can be very effective.

- **Passing out gospel tracts** or engaging people in conversation.
- **Preaching in public spaces** like parks, universities, or city streets.
- **Using creative methods like drama, music, or spoken word.**

Example:

- Sharing the gospel at a bus stop with a stranger.
- Publicly preaching at a college campus or in a city square.
- **Scripture:** *"Go into all the world and preach the gospel to all creation."* (Mark 16:15)

10 Ways You Can Be An Evangelist (Continued)

7. Evangelism Through Acts of Service. Sometimes, actions speak louder than words. Serving others can open doors for evangelism.

- **Helping those in need** (feeding the homeless, assisting widows and orphans).
- **Volunteering in community projects with the goal of sharing Jesus.**
- **Using your job or skills to serve and witness.**

Example:

- Providing meals to struggling families and praying for them.
- Volunteering at a crisis pregnancy center and sharing the gospel with clients.

Scripture: *"Let us not love with words or speech but with actions and in truth."* (1 John 3:18)

10 Ways You Can Be An Evangelist (Continued)

8. Tract and Literature Evangelism. Using Christian **pamphlets, books, and tracts** to spread the gospel.

- **Leaving gospel tracts in public places** (restaurants, coffee shops, hotels).
- **Giving out Bibles or Christian books** to seekers.
- **Mailing evangelistic materials to people.**

Example:

- Leaving a tract with a tip at a restaurant.
- Giving a Bible to a co-worker who is curious about Christianity.
- **Scripture:** *"The Lord gave the word: great was the company of those that published it."* (Psalm 68:11)

10 Ways You Can Be An Evangelist (Continued)

9. Workplace & School Evangelism. Your workplace or school is one of the best mission fields.

- **Living out your faith with integrity and kindness.**
- **Being open about your faith when conversations arise.**
- **Starting a Bible study or prayer group** at work or school.

Example:

- Offering to pray for a co-worker going through a difficult time.
- Talking about your faith when asked what you did over the weekend.
- **Scripture:** *"Work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for human masters."* (Colossians 3:23)

10 Ways You Can Be An Evangelist (Continued)

10. Missionary Evangelism (Global Missions). For those called to international missions, evangelism takes the form of **going to the nations**.

- **Short-term mission trips** – Evangelizing in different cultural contexts.
- **Long-term missions** – Planting churches and discipling new believers.
- **Supporting missionaries financially and in prayer.**

Example:

- Traveling to a foreign country to help with church planting.
- Supporting missionaries through your local church.
- **Scripture:** *"Ask of me, and I will make the nations your heritage, and the ends of the earth your possession."* (Psalm 2:8)

Summary

Evangelism is not a one-size-fits-all approach. Every believer has unique gifts and opportunities to share the gospel in different ways. What matters is that we share the gospel however we can. Jesus commanded us to make disciples, and there are countless ways to do it!
